A job share is an arrangement where two people work on a part-time basis to perform a job normally fulfilled by one person working full time. In this case, it means that the 35 hours a week worked by the Students' Union Officer role would be split between two people. A job share will not be considered alongside your studies unless you are on a part time programme.

### **Job Responsibilities**

The four elected Students' Union Officers work together to lead the Union for a year, deciding its direction, acting as trustees, and representing the voice of over 25,000 students in high-level decision making to the University and Union. They're the face of the Union, engaging with students through face-to-face chats and events, hosting awards ceremonies, and through lots of exciting content across our social media and website. From approving new university buildings to running a Fresher's Fair in Welcome, no two days are the same.

Students' Union Officers work on site 5 days a week so they can engage with students, the University, and the wider City community.

Some of the things the job entails more broadly are:

- Going out to talk to students every week to understand the issues they are facing.
- Delivering the Union priorities set by the Assembly on behalf of students by working on issues affecting them on and off campus.

### What is the NUS

The National Union of Students (NUS) is a confederation of UK students' unions that fights for student issues and a better future for higher education. They represent students at a national level, making student involvement key to ensuring our voices are heard. One way you can be a part of creating exciting change is through becoming a NUS conference delegate

### What is NUS National Conference

Is the sovereign body of the NUS - it sets policy for the year ahead and elects the NUS President, Vice Presidents and the NUS National Executive Council. It is also where the budget for the year ahead is decided through the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Every year over 1,500 delegates arrive at the conference from institutions across the United Kingdom.

### What you'll be doing?

You'll be part of a delegation of seven, that will act as the primary representatives for City Students' Union at the National Union of Students' (NUS) National Conference. Where you will have the opportunity to shape national policy, elect the new national representatives and set the political direction of the NUS according to City students' interests.

### **Submitting your Nomination**

To apply you must complete an online nomination form. Here is what you must submit with your nomination form:

- Your preferred name
- A photograph of yourself
- A 6-word slogan
- Your three priorities
- A 50-second video highlighting your three priorities (shot in portrait mode) this should be emailed to <a href="mailto:SUElections@city.ac.uk">SUElections@city.ac.uk</a> by 11:59pm on 15 February 2024

The deadline for completing an nomination form and submitting all requirements is Thursday 15 February at 11:59pm, late nominations and content will not be accepted, and you can't change any of your content after the deadline.

### Writing your priorities

As part of your nomination, you must write three priorities that you will aim to complete if elected by students. You will only have 40 words per point, which will each be presented as a paragraph, so bullet points, lists and similar will not be accepted.

### Things to consider when writing your priorities

Think about your experience at City and what matters to you most. Students who can vote for you will read your priorities when casting their vote so make sure you stand out.

- Be creative and don't worry about what other people might write.
- Top things students have told us they want to be improved
- Better guidance and support for exams and assessment.
- Better quality and more frequent personal tutoring time.
- More interactive teaching methods online and in-person.
- More on-campus events and a better student community.

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### **Candidate Rules**

### A message from the Deputy Returning Officers

Running a free and fair election is our goal – the rules over the next few pages have been designed to ensure that you, and voters have an equal and honest opportunity to elect your new Officer team.

Whilst this list of rules may seem long, it is not exhaustive, and more rules may be published at the discretion of the Returning Officer and Deputy Returning Officer. All our election rules are in addition to the Union's rules, City's regulations and The Law.

Breaking an election rule is very serious and if a candidate breaks any of the rules, then you can be sanctioned, disqualified or risk the continuation of the whole election. We really don't want any of these things to happen, so please read the following rules carefully and if you have any questions, just let us know.

We wish you all the best with your election campaign and look forward to meeting you soon.

### **Candidate Briefing**

### Information on Times and Locations

As an applicant you can start talking to students about the election at the end of the first Applicant Briefing which; this includes distributing electronic and printed publicity materials.

### In-person voting stations will be located every day in vote week at:

- Bayes Business School, Bunhill Row.
- The Law Building, Sebastian Street.
- The Pavilion, Northampton Square.
- The Rhind Building.
- Students' Union Welcome Desk, Tait Building.
- University walkway, Northampton Square.

### You must not campaign at any time in the following places:

- City, University of London libraries.
- Individual quite study spaces.
- Faith spaces (prayer rooms).
- Immediate areas around voting stations.

Promotional materials must not be put on fire exits, fire extinguishers or anything else that puts peoples' safety at risk.

### **Conduct and Behaviour**

The elections can be an intensive period for both candidates and voters, to make the experience of all students at City the best it can be we ask that you think about how you behave and do the following.

### **Towards voters:**

- Be respectful of voters.
- Do not vote on behalf of others.
- Do not communicate to students when they are voting.
- Do not provide devices to enable students to vote (e.g. phones, tablets, laptops).
- Let students vote in peace and decide for themselves.
- Request permission from staff before campaigning in a class.
- Do not send bulk emails to City students using Outlook.

### Towards other candidates:

- Respect other candidates and do not interfere with their campaign materials.
- Do not bully or harass others.
- Be kind to each other, you are all on the same journey.

### Towards union and university staff:

- Be polite if requesting to speak to a course.
- Don't ask for support or mailings to be sent out on your behalf they can't! We recommend you read the full list of the rules which can be found in Bye-Law 3: Elections here.

### **Applying as a Group of Candidates (Slates)**

Collective campaigning, otherwise known as running on a slate is allowed but regulated to ensure the slate does not have an unfair advantage over others.

The names of all students wishing to form a slate must be provided on your Nomination Form.

We'll be running candidate networking events to allow you to find people to run with, should you want to run with others:

Candidate Networking, 21 February 2024, 10am-12pm, AG07b, College Building.

The rules to consider when applying with others are: All slates must be confirmed by the close of nominations, 15 February 2024, 11:59pm.

All candidates on a slate must share:

- A combined budget.
- A group name.
- At least one shared priority.
- A shared slate slogan.
- Publicity and branding.

The slate group name will appear next to each candidate on the ballot. All members of a slate are responsible for the actions of the students in their group.

All candidates in the election, regardless of whether they are on a slate or not can recommend other candidates to voters, however any candidate that is not part of a slate must not share publicity materials of any kind.

### **Candidate Budget**

Each applicant is allowed to spend up to £75 unless you are part of a slate and must not exceed this figure.

Any money you spend will be reimbursed to you within one month of election results. To claim your money back you must keep itemised receipts of everything you buy for your campaign.

If you are part of a slate, then your budget will be reduced based on the number of other people you are running in a group with.

## Getting Help with Your Nomination (Recruiting Supporters)

Running in an election can be hard work so make sure you have a think about friends and course mates who might be able to help you. Remember, you are responsible for any person helping you with your election campaign so make sure they understand the rules

Any person planning on supporting your campaign may attend the Applicant Briefing with you. Alternatively, they can access the recording to watch in their own time.

### **Student Groups (Societies and Sports Teams)**

City societies and sports team can support applicants, or groups of applicants in their election campaign. All group endorsements will automatically be accepted on behalf of you, unless you tell us that you would refuse an endorsement from a particular society or sports team.

### A group endorsement requires:

- The agreement of the society or team committee.
- A recorded agreement sent by the President or Captain to SUElections@city.ac.uk.
- Confirmation via email from the Union.

Once an endorsement is confirmed by the Union groups, they may then use their membership lists and social media to promote those they have endorsed.

Society or sports team funds must not be used to finance any election campaign.

If you are the President, a committee member, or otherwise hold a position of power in a society or sports team you must not command other students in the group to campaign or vote for you.

Remember, individual members of a society have the freedom to vote for who they want, so just because a group endorses you does not mean all members will vote for you.

### Student media

Student media groups (Carrot Radio, Carrot Magazine, Carrot TV) must remain impartial and cannot endorse any candidates on their official online channels and social media.

### **Re-running Candidates**

If you are currently an elected Student Officer (Students' Union Officer or Assembly Member) then there are additional rules that you need to be aware of.

All campaign publicity and public announcements must be agreed with Phil Gilks, Chief Executive or Chris Moore, Communications and Business Development from Monday 29 January – Thursday 29 February 2024 to avoid potential electoral advantage

The Union offices, including the Welcome Desk must not be used for electoral purposes.

Students' Union Officers needing to use the office for day-to-day work during voting days must agree in advance with the Chief Executive.

Students' Union Officers re-running to be a Students' Union Officer or Assembly Member must run entirely separately from their day-to-day work and are required to take annual leave from Monday 26 February – Thursday 29 February 2024.

These rules are to make sure that you are clear on what you can and cannot do in the lead up to the election, and so other candidates understand how we ensure everyone has a fair opportunity when applying for a role.

### **Promotional Materials**

We want students to be informed about who is running to represent them. Each candidate has a healthy budget to spend on electronic and printed promotional materials.

Here are some ideas for spending your budget, but remember - think sustainably and only order what you need:

In addition to your own promotional materials the Union will promote each candidate on printed materials, our website and social media platforms, including but not limited to:

- Flyers
- Candidate booklet
- Union elections website
- Union social media channels

Restricted items and placement

- Balloons are not allowed under any circumstances.
- Stickers are not allowed under any circumstances.
- Promotional materials must not be put on fire exits, fire extinguishers or anything else that puts peoples' safety at risk.

### **Voting**

Voting for the elections opens on Monday 26 February, 9:00am and closes on Thursday 29 February, 4:00pm.

Voting will be by single transferable vote – this means when students vote they will number their candidates by order of preference.

All voting is open 24 hours a day for the durtation of the voting period.

All voting will take place online and we will design promotional materials to make sure students know about all the candidates they can vote for.

There will be voting stations located on campus, below is the timetable so you can organise your time accordingly.

### **Complaints**

We want the elections to be enjoyable for all candidates, students and staff so if you are worried that a rule has been broken by another person, just let us know. To submit a complaint, fill in this form.

We will get back to you within 24 hours. From the point you submit your complaint, through to the complaint being closed.

This is normally what happens during the complaints process:

- 1. Complaint submitted; Deputy Returning Officer notified.
- 2. Complaints reviewed in order they are submitted.
- 3. Investigation stats, complainant receives notification of complaint raised against them.
- 4. Deputy Returning Officer reviews evidence submitted.
- 5. Following an investigation all students involved in the complaint contacted.
- 6. If required, additional evidence and information is requested.
- 7. Final decision is made by Deputy Returning Officer based on evidence.
- 8. Complaint outcome is communicated to everyone involved.
- a) If a minor sanction is applied to a candidate there is no right of appeal.
- b) If a major sanction, such as disqualification, is applied then the candidate may appeal to Peter Robertson, Returning Officer and must do so within 24 hours of the outcome being communicated.
- 9. Complaint closed.

The deadline for submitting a complaint about a candidate or slate is Thursday 29 February, 5:00pm.

The deadline for submitting a complaint about the vote count is within one day of the results being announced.

### **Jargon Buster**

Word	Definition
Slate	A group of candidates that formally organise and run together in the elections on common priorities.
Job share	Up to two candidates may run on a Job Share for one Students' Union Officer position. They will be treated as one candidate for the purposes of the elections and the combined job share will equal the equivalent of one full time Students' Union Officer.
Supporter	Any person who supports a candidate in their election. Candidates are responsible for the actions of their supporters.
Student group	Any Union or City, University of London affiliated group of students including but not limited to Societies and Sports Teams.
Returning Officer	The person who has sole responsibility for interpretation of election rules.
Deputy Returning Officer	The person who is responsible for the day-to-day management of the election and has the responsibility to ensure that the election is efficient and fair.
Election Official	An 'election official' includes the Returning Officer, Deputy Returning Officer, and any other person nominated by the Deputy Returning Officer to be an election official.
